

TRACK DESCRIPTIONS

- 1) **The Art of Forgetting** (5:09) *Tender and evocative, fiddle, guitar, harmony vocals*. A sensual autumnal song about love lost with a distinctive Celtic Americana feel.
- 2) Siubhail a Rùin [shool-a-roon] (3:45)—Jazz inflections, New Orleans trumpet, southern swing. A highly distinctive, percussive and fresh take on the traditional Irish ballad, with a new translation to Scottish Gaelic.
- 3) **Come Back to Me** (4:42)—*Cajun-inspired waltz, fiddle, ocean-wave sounding accordion.* An original waltz with a timeless melody, that re-tells the story of the widowed narrator of 'Siubhail a Rùin'.
- 4) **Opal Grey** (5:14)—Lushly layered harmony vocals, guitar, percussion and flute. A stirring, British-isles inspired revisitation of loss of love, with strong nautical imagery and shimmery, stormy percussion.
- 5) **Tell Me Love** (5:02)—Banjo, fiddle, and octave mandolin with sweet, soft harmony vocals. A gentle love song, which uses natural imagery to explore the freshness and wonder of love re-discovered.
- 6) Sweet Damnation (5:47) Guitar, trumpet, trombone and flute make for a distinctive playful mix with subtle 70's inflections. A slightly retro-sounding track which uses verdant summer imagery to evoke the heat of passion.
- 7) Tillie Sage (4:21)—Banjo, guitar, fiddle, and eerie, breathy backing vocals. A rootsy and spooky Appalachian-inspired re-telling of Charles Dickens' famed Miss Havisham.
- 8) Sios Dhan an Abhainn [she-us gan an aween] (4:43)—Bluesy guitar, percussion, trumpet, trombone and rich harmony vocals. A Louisiana-flavored, soulful interpretation of the classic American psalm 'Down to the River' translated into Scottish Gaelic and flavored with the Bavou.
- 9) For Your Journey (2:04)—Acapella with pump organ and two lone voices. An original gospel-inspired duet with Rhiannon Giddens which incorporates Biblical imagery, Greek mythology and allusions to the Underground Railroad
- 10) **Evelyna** (4:44)—*Picked guitar, fiddle, whistle and gentle backing vocals.* A story-song that captures the smoky, fire and star-lit south through the tale of the beguiling Evelyna and her escape to the city.
- 11) **Puirt à Beul** [porsht-u-beel] (4:17)—*Percussively strummed guitar, percussion and piano*. A Scottish Gaelic 'mouth-music' song that is accompanied by Uist singer Gillebride MacMillan -with a light sprinkling of Cajun spice.
- 12) **Trouble in the Fields** (4:49)—The full-band finale with guitar, fiddle, percussion, piano and rich backing vocals. A Celtic and Cajun-inflected tribute to the great Nanci Griffith with an old-time fiddle and piano fade-out that allows for the record to spin down, and brings the album full-circle.
